

# **KEYNOTE**

# **Tyler Westcott**

In 2009, Tyler received recognition for his contributions to the Portage and Nunda communities. He regularly volunteered at Special Olympics as his personal credo was that people should not belittle others for their differences. He was active in band, both high school and jazz. At age 14 he organized his own band and recorded multiple CD's. Much of Tyler's music reflected themes of tolerance, peace, and the impact of violence on the world. Today, Tyler is a well-known musician in the Buffalo-Rochester area. He gives back to his community, raising money and collecting food for Buffalo's Friends of Night People, a charitable organization that helps the poor, homeless, and destitute. He often plays for nursing homes and schools, and hosts touring musicians at his home, and in turn, has friends all over the country. His band, Folkfaces, released their second CD last summer and he is a featured musician on The Observers and Black Rock Zydeco CDs. In addition, he has two other projects he has developed: Banjo Juice Jazz Band, and a Gypsy Jazz group called *The Paper Roses*.
